



I am honoured to share with you the remarkable progress and achievements of the Mackay-Whitsunday-Isaac Healthy Rivers to Reef Partnership across FY23. Our Partners represent a wide range of key sectors including resources, agriculture, science, ports, community, conservation, tourism, traditional owners, all tiers of government, and more.

The collective knowledge and insight leveraged when it comes to waterway health, is considerable.

In FY23, the Healthy Rivers to Reef Partnership, comprising 34 leading organisations, exerted action, collaboration and influence in the Mackay, Whitsunday and Isaac communities.

Through joint investment, we addressed critical data gaps, forged collaborations that drove on-ground and impactful activity, and engaged with a broad spectrum of stakeholders and communities.

The release of the 2021 Report Card in July 2022 revealed a range of waterway health scores from A to D across the region's 18 key graded areas, reflecting results for 5 freshwater basins, 8 estuary areas and 5 marine zones. Results highlighted where more information is needed, where achievements can be celebrated, and

where more work and investment is needed.

We also celebrated the release of the Above and Beyond Stewardship Report in October 2022, highlighting the many projects being undertaken by our Partners to improve waterway and environmental health, and drive regional sustainability.

The breadth and variety of activities across our region is worth celebrating as partners continue to draw on their own strengths and join forces with others – all working together for waterway health.

We are proud to work with the Traditional Owners of our region and excitingly in FY23 the Partnership also committed to supporting the development of a Koinmerburra Healthy Country Plan.

Looking forward, our Partnership's strength lies in its diversity, unity, and commitment to a common goal: the wellbeing and longevity of our waterways. We recognise waterways – from rivers to reef – are truly a critical asset, economically, socially and environmentally. I extend my deepest gratitude to each member for their tireless efforts and look forward to another year of shared successes and growth.

In June 2023, the Partnership said farewell to Julie Boyd after five years as the Partnership's Chair. Julie's exceptional leadership and strong advocacy sees the Partnership well positioned for an exciting next chapter. We welcomed Charlie Morgan as the Partnership's new, incoming Chair in July 2023.

As a former Mayor of Mackay, Julie's strength in advocating for action in protecting and maintaining waterway health was greatly appreciated by the Partners and team, as was her strong connections in the natural resource sector and broader community.

After five years in the role, Julie has seen a lot of changes. Over her tenure, the Partnership grew to 34 members, and in 2019 we published the first Stewardship Report – a compendium of Partner projects showcasing what the Partnership is doing to maintain or improve waterway health.

Julie said she was most proud of seeing the different partner organisations coming together for one common purpose.

"The beauty of the Partnership is the diversity of organisations that are seated around the table, united by the interests of protecting their local environment," Julie said.

"There aren't many situations where you would have these different stakeholders – from all levels of government, agriculture, and industry, working with environmental organisations and community groups in a truly collaborative way for the benefit of the community.

"The Partnership really is unique, and I'm proud to have been a part of it – as should all the Partners."
